






SOS Homophobia posters tagged by STAPS's students,

Sport with or without pleasure, violence?

 Positive Emotions, more or less shared, publicized...

 Negative Emotions (violence against oneself, adversaries, supporters, clubs, countries...)

(direct and/or symbolic* violence)

Yet, « discrimination is violence »

(Kerr, 2006, 74).

1) Discrimination as subordination or « inferiorization » (Shaw, 2005).

Reality (objectivity) + Feeling (subjectivity)

From age, gender, occupation, place of residence, religion, sexual orientation*, "race" (n=126 in USA inquiries)...

Pb: categorizations useful to science
Indicators to "measure" discrimination ⇔
Elements of understanding social life



Different discrimination

CUMULATIVE process Ampersand discrimination

Hypothesis:

1)Discriminations are plural

2) Focalisation on « race », sex, sexual orientation, motor disabilities covers others discriminations (sport "glorificationstarification", psychological disabilities, invisible chronic illness...)

• Direct or not

- legal or legitimated (e.g. by sport)
- Dissimulated or not
- Positive or negative
- into access or into treatment
- from discussed indexes-signals: "voluntary" (sexual orientation) vs.
 "immutable"characteristics (color of skin)

Trained (in)capaciti -es

- Situational discriminations (misogyny, LGBTIQ"phobia" (individual/collective rejection, invisibilisation...)
- Structural discriminations (WASPH over visibility, glass ceiling sexism, racism, power of underground networks...) => rare stigma switch
- Expression of discrimination to construct womanhood (Corbett, 2001)
- => Internalization of discrimination (powerless, less self-esteem, suicide...)


• Legal (equality) frames (Title IX, FARE,)

⇒ more **insidious, invisible exactions**, "everyday inferiorizations" (Norman, 2011)

- Politic actions to sensitize actors (to promote who? Politicians? Most acceptable people?*)
- Fear of partners, coaches, managers, directors, parents... :
 - ego assimilation
 - modification of management
 - limitation of career
 - restriction of future Financial supports...



Civil and Emic Mobilizations against sexism, racism,...



• Collective Privates actions :

- FSGL, Eurogame, GG, Outgame...
- fan groups actions,
- Foundations : L. Thuram in France (2008-), Theatrical Company Le Trimaran (1996-, S. Tournu-Romain)...
- Individual Privates actions :
 - Change patronym (Gullit, Kopa)
 - Relative Easily Coming out are function of performers + high masculine capital + Youth White middle class in USA, specially for runners, swimmers, tennis players lived in a SPORT "SUPPORTIVE CULTURE" (Anderson, 2011)

very high homosexual-masculine cost + very thin inclusive process and context



Social an Sport Gains and Innovations

"ASK and TELL": who can/can't?

USA Gay/Lesbian League which include transgender athletes.

To a "**softening** gender binary" (Travers, 2006, 444) Active minorities develop (Moscovici, 1979) :

- Own organizations and powers
- Vigilance about negative logo, jokes, ...
- Creation of positive logo, names, symbols ("Pride(ness)", "gaies"...)
- Switch of Medical label*: now (killed) homophobia ⇔ personality disorder (bipolar, Orlando, june 2016)...



Human and Social Science to promote Awareness of...

Science as process

- Promote the exercises of: -Historical,

- cultural
- comparisons
- -"distance of

rule" as a game

-Trained self objectivity

process to different

subjects

- Stereotypes (as frame limitation of Human Life) : e.g. danger of binary logic, jokes,...
- Real Powers (which oppress) and to reveal it (to reveal social-cultural unthinkable)

Unconscious limitations

- Getting Power to resist, to propose actions (to observe/express empowerment, social participation)
- Importance of social context (to express variety and richness of life)



Towards inclusive sport?!


Into competitive and commercial sport, this is a real challenge, an inversion of "agôn" values "to unseat in humans predation, the domination of the Other » (Gardou, 2012)

"anthropological universals:

- the polyphony of the human,
- changes of its appearance,
- its impermanence,

and essential puniness" (47-48)
